SUNDAY November 17, 2019 33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

These days, apocalyptic literature has the whole world sitting up and paying attention. It's starting to make sense and sound unhappily familiar. Lately, we begin to suspect those times are ours, and that vision is not so outrageous after all. Apocalyptic feeling is the sort of thing that comes around every few generations. Human history is remarkably messy, and depending on when and where you are born, your window on the world is open to interpretation. It's no accident that both Hebrew and Christian scripture end with apocalypse.



Apocalypses begin and end in the heart of each believer. The journey

toward divine revelation, as any mystic will tell you, is an interior trek. The dark night of the soul is nothing less than the battle of the good and evil within us. We try to be loving people; honest in our business dealings and service to the community; faithful to our friends and family; prayerful and thankful to God for the goodness and mercy we receive each day. But even with the most rigorous spiritual discipline, we cannot avoid the fight for our soul. And as Jesus advises us, we cannot prepare our testimony in advance, because we have no way to know when the battle will begin or what will trigger it. Make no mistake though, at some point you will find yourself fighting the good fight against apathy, anger, doubt, pride, resentment, or greed. You will feel unhappy, unappreciated, and unloved. It will be a hellish time, but don't despair. On the other side of your trials awaits a loving God. Apocalypses have their rewards.

Saint Paul faced the same challenges with the Thessalonians. Though he had recently helped them establish a Christian community, some of them felt entitled to eat though they were unwilling to work, and others were minding everyone's business but their own .It's hard to pay attention to our own lives. It's tempting to be caught up in everybody's business but our own. But growth in Christian spirituality demands that we live our own life and mind our own business. While we are to be responsive to the needs of others, we are, in the end, responsible for our own lives and our own faith. Trust in God but tie your camel, the Arab proverb shrewdly recommends. We are in the world but not of the world and need to combine the qualities of serpents and doves in our dealings in the marketplace. Describe a time in your life that felt apocalyptic: destructive, chaotic, transforming, final. What had to be surrendered, and what came to life through that experience? When have you looked to a political or religious leader with hope for a better plan? Were your hopes realized or disappointed? Jesus said the temple of his day would be thrown down when worldly power passes. What aspects of modern religious life might be unmasked as worldly on the day of the Lord? Nilus of Ancyra writes...by patient endurance you will win life for yourselves, although to this must be added wholehearted thanksgiving, and prayer, and humility. For you must be ready to bless and praise your benefactor, God the savior of the world, who disposes all things, good or otherwise, for your benefit.
