CHRISTMAS LETTER 2018

Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

It is a pleasure for me to offer heartfelt good wishes for a blessed Christmas and a Happy New Year to you and your families. In this blessed season, I invite you to offer your warm prayers for those members of our beloved parish who are prevented by illness from attending our Christmas celebrations. Let us also remember all those of our community who have gone before us and, by the intercession of Blessed Mary, ever Virgin, and all the saints, have come to the fellowship of eternal bliss. As well, let us offer our solidarity to those all over the world who need the rebirth of joy, hope and peace.

The Nativity of our Lord expresses God's deepest desire for nearness with us, as He "looked favorably on His people and redeemed them" (Luke 1:68).
